JUDY: It's a good fit.2


MARK: Actually, I feel funny in these formal clothes.3 I like T-shirts, jeans, and sweatshirts. Is the tie OK?

This is my cell phone.	This cell phone is great.
That is your jacket.	That tie is Steve's.
These are my keys.	These keys don't work.
Those are your keys.	Those keys are Steve's.





GRAMMAR NOTES

1 Possessive Nouns

Possessive nouns show belonging.

I'm wearing my **roommate's** shoes.

(The shoes belong to my roommate.)

He's wearing **Joe's** sports jacket.

(The sports jacket belongs to Joe.)

Add an **apostrophe** ($\dot{}$) + -s to a singular noun or an irregular plural noun.

Add only an **apostrophe** (') to a plural noun ending in -s.

That's my **father's** jacket. Where's the **men's** restroom?

It's her **parents'** anniversary. It's the **Becks'** house.

2 This, That, These, Those

This, that, these, and those can be pronouns or adjectives. When they are adjectives, they come before a noun.

PRONOUN

This is my hat.

ADJECTIVE NOUN

This hat is new.

PRONOUN

These are my sunglasses.

ADJECTIVE NOUN

These sunglasses are Robert's.

Remember that *this* and *that* are singular; *these* and *those* are plural. (See Units 2 and 4.)

Use *this* and *these* for things that are **near**. Use *that* and *those* for things that are **away** from you.

This is my T-shirt.
These are my T-shirts.

This cell phone in my hand is new.

That cell phone on the table is old.

USAGE NOTE *That's* is often used in speaking and informal writing. It refers to the idea that was just stated.

A: I really like her parents.

B: That's great.

A: I really don't like her brother.

B: That's too bad.

A: He's in Boston. That's why he's not here.



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PRONUNCIATION NOTE

Possessive Noun Endings

The 's in a possessive noun sounds like /s/, /z/, or /iz/.

· /s/

· /z/

• /IZ/ (This sound adds an extra syllable.)

This is my aunt's hat.

My uncle's hat is on the table.

His boss's name is Mr. Lee.
